A call to world changers – Strictly invitation only

Ecology of Care is an initiative from the Faculty of Engineering at the University of Southern Denmark. It is designed to research and promote the concept of *Care* in all walks of life. Care is essentially about tackling societal challenges from a human and ecological point of view, something of a reversed perspective on the current technology driven paradigm. We see this as an extraordinary opportunity for real and useful innovation on a global scale.

We invite 'panelists' to join us who can think differently - who would like to discuss and develop innovative, world changing ideas with a broad range of the invited industry leaders. This is a unique and rare opportunity. We have collected top minds from industry and academia to meet, to work together; to develop scenarios for change in a world short on ideas for real change.

The event: (In)forming an Ecology of Care : A gathering of experts with a vision for Care

This is an International Congress on the *Ecology of Care*, to be held in Copenhagen. Twelve specially selected leaders from twelve different fields of industry have been invited to present their vision for *Care*, focusing on innovation opportunities with some of the biggest challenges facing the world today. As well as their insights, and as a counterpoint to their views, we are inviting panellists to discuss and debate each of the speaker scenarios in forum, in order to further develop their ideas into actionable pathways. The International Congress in November builds on the success of The *Ecology of Care* International Symposium and Workshop that was held in Copenhagen in February 2015 where Care as a field of research and practice was first established.

Why an ecology of Care? What's the problem?

Ecology of Care examines the fundamental reasons why and how we do what we do in relation to the many challenges we face. On a global scale, the worlds of technology and nature are out of balance, and this provides many new opportunities for innovation and the advancement of science and culture.

In the human world, we are dealing with domestic and international violence, displaced and traumatised people, and economic systems that in many cases result in inequality in terms of quality of life, education, and material possessions. Globally, an aging population is acting as a driver for often hidden psychological issues such as loneliness, depression and suicide, as well as physical health concerns such as diabetes, hypertension and heart disease. In the natural world some of the greatest challenges we face include resource depletion, air and water quality, habitat degradation, biodiversity, and the effects of climate change.

All of these issues can be directly linked to the manner in which technologies in their various forms have been applied in what has been an outstanding period of human development over the past 250 years. The world has changed so significantly and in such complex ways, often without understanding the reasons why we develop and implement technology or fully understanding its effects. Major innovation on a global scale is needed and the technological know-how is already

available. The opportunities are now. The most urgent imperative is for new roadmaps that will guide us in capitalising on these opportunities – this is the basis for the *Ecology of Care* program. The congress will operate on the basis of a moderated forum where invited speakers will present their ideas for change and these will be discussed with the active participation of all congress participants. We will foster a rich and creative environment to support the free exchange of ideas so that we can develop realistic and useful scenarios for change. The proceedings and recorded presentations will be edited and published on the website as well as through a number of media channels. No paper submissions are required from participants however a short statement describing your reasons for attending is part of the registration process and this will help us know something about who is coming and facilitate meetings between other participants who might be interested in meeting you.

These are the topics areas that have been chosen and within which we will frame our discussions on this occasion, however the broader goal of this congress and the wider project is to consider how an *Ecology of Care* might be relevant in any field - so we are very open to other ideas and interests.

What do you get out of it? <u>Why you should attend</u>

This a unique opportunity to show that you are a;

- World changer who takes a responsible stance in your field, someone who has something to say about how things might be made better.
- World changer who is respected in your field such that others will want to hear what you have to say.
- World changer who others in your field will recognize for your expertise and knowledge so that actions initiated on the basis of your input will be respected and accepted.
- World changer who wants to make a lasting, significant and valuable contribution to the world that you have had the privilege of experiencing in your lifetime and that you would wish to pass onto others.

What would we like you to do - what do we need?

In order to build on the *EoC* platform established so far, we need to develop models and scenarios within which we can all see different ways in which an *Ecology of Care* can be usefully applied. We need people with considerable life and industry experience to;

- Consider a (preferably) positive 'position' or stance on how the ideals represented in an *Ecology of Care* might be applied in your field and, in particular, consider how it might be received and/or implemented in practical ways.
- Take an active part in the moderated discussions
- Be prepared to speak up at the congress, to openly discuss with the key speakers and other panelists (without too much ego), your ideas for a caring future.
 - The above discussions will be recorded and made available as an open resource for further development by all of the attendees.
 - Position papers will be developed out of the discussion sessions by the speakers and combined into an edited publication which forms a roadmap for future actions designed to advance an Ecology of Care as a field and mode of practice.
 - A copy of this publication (acknowledging and referencing your contributions) will be provided free of charge to all panelists and speakers, following the congress.
